




External Financial Resources for International Students

Be aware of scams!
How to spot a scholarship scam?

1. Not everybody is eligible; restrictions always apply.
2. Many scams misspell the “scholarship” as ‘scholarship’.
3. You should never have to pay for scholarship information.
4. No one else should apply for a scholarship in your behalf.
5. Never give out your credit card or bank account number.
6. Very few scholarships require a fee. Do a little research before paying for it.
7. Organizations who offer funds must explicitly state the amount offered.
