OVERVIEW OF BOREN AWARDS



Boren awards fund study abroad in countries not ordinarily visited by American students. Students must be U.S. citizens to apply; they should have a GPA of 3.3+.

BOREN AWARDS - DEFINITIONS

- **Boren Awards** are administered by The Institute of International Education (IIE).
- **Boren Scholarships** pay for one semester or one year of academic study abroad for U.S. undergraduates. Boren Scholars must remain matriculated in their undergraduate programs for the duration of the scholarship. Study-abroad programs for one year are preferred.
- **Boren awards** focus on countries, languages, and fields critical to U.S. national security, recognizing a broad definition that includes traditional concerns of protecting American well-being, as well as the challenges of the global society, such as sustainable development, environmental issues, disease, migration, women's rights, and economic competitiveness.
- **Grants from the Language Flagship Program** are designed to help students achieve superior-level proficiency in critical languages. Flagship students participate in intensive language programs offered at selected undergraduate institutions.
- **The African Flagship Languages Initiative (AFLI)** offers Boren Scholars the opportunity to study African languages (e.g., Swahili, Yoruba, Zulu, Akan/Twi, Hausa, Wolof, and Portuguese) in domestic and overseas language programs.
- **The Indonesian Flagship Language Initiative (IFLI)** offers Boren Scholars the opportunity for intensive study of the Indonesian language (Bahasa Indonesia) through a combination of domestic and overseas programs.
- **The South Asian Languages Flagship Initiative (SAFLI)** offers Boren Scholars the opportunity to study South Asian languages (e.g., Hindi & Urdu) in domestic and overseas language programs.
- **The Turkish Flagship Language Initiative (TURFLI)** offers Boren Scholars the opportunity for intensive study of the Turkish language through a combination of domestic and overseas programs.
- **Service requirement:** In exchange for funding, all recipients of Boren grants must be willing to complete a term of service equal to that of their award either to the Federal Government or in an area of education related to their language study.

AWARD AMOUNTS ≈ BOREN SCHOLARSHIPS:

- \$8,000 for a summer program (8-11 weeks; STEM majors only; see below)
- \$12,500 for a semester (12-24 weeks)
- \$25,000 for a full academic year (25-52 weeks)

SPECIAL INITIATIVE FOR STEM (SCIENCE, TECHNOLOGY, ENGINEERING, AND MATHEMATICS) MAJORS:

Boren Scholarships fund up to \$8,000 for summer study (8-11 weeks) for students majoring in the STEM fields. All other applicants must plan to study overseas for at least a semester. STEM field majors may also apply for semester and year program.
